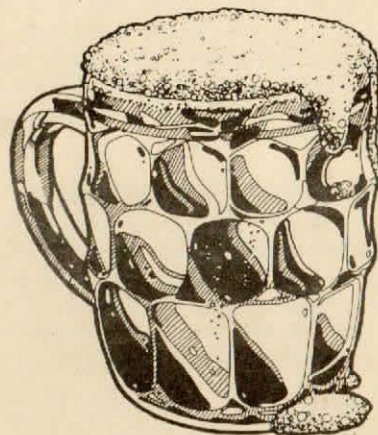

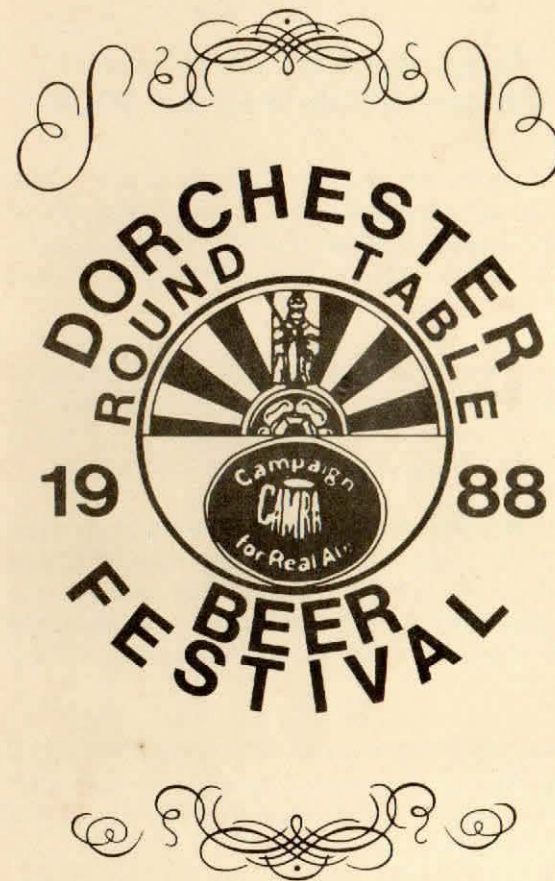

Dorchester Beer Festival 1988

Organised by Dorchester Round Table and CAMRA

Welcome to the first Dorchester Beer Festival, organised jointly by members of Dorchester Round Table and the local branch of CAMRA, the Campaign for Real Ale.

The event has been generously sponsored by a number of local firms, and in particular our thanks are extended to Eldridge Pope & Co plc and H Meyers & Sons of Dorchester.

Any profits from the Festival are to be divided equally between Dorchester Round Table and CAMRA. Round Table being a charitable organisation, it is hoped that local charities will benefit directly as a result of the Festival.

Music will be provided on Friday evening by the Mill Street Jazz Band. On Saturday lunchtime, the Frome Valley Morris Men will be dancing.

Subject to availability, it is hoped to offer 14 different real ales. Sweet and dry cider, made in the traditional way by Perrys of Somerset, and soft drinks are also available. Refreshments are supplied by Dorchester Ladies' Circle.



The Beers

Adnams Best Bitter (OG 1036)

A well-hopped bitter from East Anglia's famous sea-side brewery at Southwold. Adnams offer real ale in all 75 pubs and 1900 free trade accounts in the South East.

Batemans XXXB (OG 1048)

1st prize in the 'Special Bitter' class at the Great British Beer Festival 1988, this is a powerful malty ale from the Skegness Brewery, one of Britain's true family breweries, maintaining close links with the local community. Only one of their 99 pubs does not sell their 'good honest ales' in traditional form.

Butcombe Bitter (OG 1039)

A dry and clean tasting ale brewed at Butcombe, Blagdon, Avon. A brewery established in 1978 by a former Courage Western Managing Director and now brewing over 7000 barrels a year for Avon and North Somerset free trade. The Brewery now owns three pubs.

Eldridge Pope: Original IPA — (OG 1041) Royal Oak — (OG 1048)

Original IPA: A well-hopped beer.
Royal Oak: A full-bodied malty brew brewed here in Dorchester, the beers being available in 180 tied houses.

Felinfoel Double Dragon (OG 1040)

A malty bitter brewed in Llanelli, Dyfed. Britain's former champion brewers, the brewery now serving beers without top pressure in 30 of its 76 pubs.

Golden Hill Exmoor Ale (OG 1039)

A malty, well-balanced beer from Wiveliscombe, Somerset, the beer having the unique distinction of winning the best bitter award at CAMRA's Great British Beer Festival only months after starting in 1980. 80 outlets served in the South West.

Hook Norton Mild (OG 1032)

A light and fruity mild from the Banbury brewery, the brewery itself being one of the prettiest traditional breweries in the country serving an extensive free trade and with all 35 country pubs serving real ale.

Palmers Tally Ho (OG 1046)

A nutty summer brew from the local Bridport brewery (the only thatched brewery in the country).

Ringwood Old Thumper (OG 1060)

Champion Beer of Britain at the CAMRA Great British Beer Festival earlier this year in Leeds, this well-hopped strong bitter — "Extra Special Ale" — is brewed at the Ringwood Brewery which was established by one of the fathers of the new brewery revolution, Peter Austin, (who also helped many others start brewing). New premises acquired in 1985 and now two tied houses and at least 80 free trade outlets.

Tom Brown's Best Bitter (OG 1036 — 40)

AND

Flashman's Clout (OG 1040 — 44)

Tom Brown's Best Bitter: A light and hoppy smooth session beer.
Flashman's Clout: A full-bodied malty ale. From Dorchester's smaller brewery! Both beers are brewed by the full mash system using only the best quality malt and hops, fermented and allowed to naturally condition in casks, all on the premises here in Dorchester at Tom Brown's Public House, 47 High East Street, Dorchester.

Wadsworth Farmers Glory (OG 1046)

A dark and distinctive brew from the Devizes brewery. All of its 150 houses sell real ale. Best known for the excellent 6X, the brewery is now opening houses in cities such as Bristol and Southampton.

Youngs Special Bitter (OG 1046)

A full flavoured and distinctive ale from Wandsworth, London SW18 brewery, being one of the most warmly regarded breweries in the country which, in the early 1970s, stood alone against the revolution of keg bitter. All 145 pubs offer real ale, some delivered by horse-drawn drays.
